



Mr. John D Hicks

June 26, 1930 - June 20, 2017

John D. Hicks, who enjoyed traveling and was founder of the Dundalk travel agency, Going Places, died Tuesday from complications of prostate cancer at Stella Maris Hospice.

The longtime Homeland resident was 86.

"He knew the business and loved to travel and sell travel," said Susan Bittner, who began her career 43 years ago at Going Places as a receptionist and is now manager. "I've been here since the get-go and I learned from the very best. I've been very lucky."

"He was very well-educated, worldly, well-read, and theater was his passion," said Scott Babus who went to work for the agency 22 years ago. "He was always our support, and to use a travel analogy, captain of the ship. Our guiding principle was always, 'What would Mr. Hicks do in this situation?'"

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"His employees loved him and he loved teaching them the travel business," said his daughter, Emily B. Hicks of Federal Hill, who for three years has been president and owner of the business. "There is very little staff turnover with many of his employees having worked there 40, 30 or at least 20 years."

The son of John Alfred Hicks, an entrepreneur, and Teresa Britton, a homemaker, John David Hicks was born and raised in Cleveland, Ohio, and graduated there from St. Ignatius High School.

After obtaining a bachelor's degree in 1951 from what is now John Carroll University in University Heights, Ohio, Mr. Hicks enlisted in the Army and served in the infantry.

A son, Adam J. Hicks, of New York City, noted in a profile of his father's life a memorable incident that occurred during his service. He said his father's "unintentional firing of a bazooka backwards during basic training did not go over so well with certain sergeants."

While working at an Army induction center in Seattle, a fellow recruit suggested that Mr. Hicks get a job with United Airlines.

"He put the seed in my mind," Mr. Hicks told The Dundalk Eagle in a 2013 interview.

United Airlines was not hiring at the time but Pan American World Airways

was, so in 1956 he began his career in the travel industry.

After marrying in 1963, he left Pan Am and moved to Baltimore where he subsequently worked for Travel Guide and Bon Voyage Travel. In 1973, he established Going Places on the lower level of Eastpoint Mall.

"I felt it was time to open my own," he said in The Eagle article.

Opening at Eastpoint Mall proved to be a propitious business decision for Mr. Hicks. Someone had advised him that the Bethlehem Steelworkers who lived in the area — and whose children were now raised and gone — had the yearn to travel and the disposable income to make it a reality.

"He also brought a man's perspective to travel," Mr. Babus said.

Eventually, Mr. Hicks expanded the business to six offices. Today, in addition to the original agency, there is one other Going Places at Southdale Shopping Center in Glen Burnie.

Mr. Hicks told The Dundalk Eagle that one of his secrets to longevity was his agency's non-reliance on commercial and airline travel. Going Places "always catered to vacation travel."

When airlines began to lose money after the Sept. 11, 2001 World Trade Center and Pentagon attacks, they stopped paying commissions to travel agents which resulted in many agencies going out of business.

"We weren't just dependent on airline tickets," he explained in the 2013 interview. "We never relied on commercial accounts, so when they stopped commissions on airline tickets, it didn't hurt us."

While competition from Expedia and Travelocity took away some customers who were able to plan vacations online, others remained because of the human element — and the fact they could put a vacation on a layaway plan.

"The customers loved him and he loved them," Ms. Bittner said. "He had a great sense of humor and I never saw him angry."

His humor often made its way into the workplace.

"He'd be on the phone and would look at me and say, 'Someone is interested in an Hawaiian trip.' That was the cue for me to put on a cassette of Hawaiian music," recalled Ms. Bittner with a laugh. "And then after he made the sale, he'd say, 'Works every time.'"

Mr. Hicks' personal favorite travel destinations included Europe, the Caribbean and New York City, where he maintained an apartment.

"He enjoyed going to Alaska and Mackinac Island in Michigan. He even enjoyed going to Cleveland to see relatives," Mr. Babus said.

Though he retired three years ago, he continued coming into the office and kept his hand in the operation, Ms. Hicks said.

His philanthropic efforts included participation in charities operating in Central America, "an area of the world that piqued his interest after traveling to Nicaragua in the 1980s," his son wrote.

He enjoyed listening to classical music, visiting art galleries, collecting American art and playing his piano. During his frequent visits to New York City he attended Broadway shows, the Metropolitan Opera and ballet.

"He really was a very simple man. He loved his apartment in New York and going to Mass every day," Ms. Hicks said.

Mr. Hicks was a communicant at St. Mary of the Assumption Roman Catholic Church, 5502 York Road, Govans, where a Mass of Christian burial will be offered at 10 a.m. Monday.

In addition to his son and daughter, Mr. Hicks is survived by two other sons, David B. Hicks of Ellicott City and Jay A. Hicks of Denver; and four grandchildren. A marriage to the former Mary Margaret "Krieket" Krichton ended in divorce.

“ John Hicks was an incredible man. He loved life to the fullest, and everyone loved him. I first met John in January, 1972 when I applied for a position with him at Diners Fugazy Travel, later to be known as Bon Voyage Travel on Cold Spring Lane. I remember the interview well, being very nervous, sitting there in my plaid uniform and saddle shoes. Mr. Hicks had called the business department at the Institute of Notre Dame to hire his employees. I think I had more questions for him than he had for me; I didn't even know what a travel agency was! He hired me to write airline tickets. No computers back then. I still have a bump on my finger because you had to press hard to go through all the copies. He was a patient teacher, and taught me all the ins and outs of the travel business. But, he taught me more than than that. He taught me life long skills that I still use to this day.

I helped him open the Eastpoint agency, Clipper Travel in 1973, and remember my dad helping him to repaint the office before we moved in. I also remember the red shag carpet! We did very well that 1st year, and continued to hire more employees. Once again, he called IND to hire our next employee. A bubbly, blonde haired, Susan Friesner, a Dundalk resident, was our next employee. An employee to this day, 43 years later Susan Bittner, is a testament to John's leadership. While being a successful full service travel agency, he had expanded to Glen Burnie, Pratt Street, and White Marsh hiring more and more employees; Donna, Michele, Penny, David, Daisy, Angela and more. I remember he and I would drive in his station wagon with the brown, wooden sides to the Glen Burnie location to deliver supplies. One day we purchased a brand new, electronic typewriter. That was high tech back then.

He was always good to his employees taking us to the Lyric to see *The Nutcracker* and out to dinner to Tio Pepi's for Christmas. We would also be invited to parties at his house where he and his family welcomed us with a gracious dinner from soup to nuts. We always had a good time talking with his children, Emily, Jay, David, and Adam.

He gave me the leadership skills and travel skills that have served me well to this day. I will never forget how fortunate I am to have known this gentle giant. Thanks for the memories, John D. Hicks. Prayers for his family and friends. He will be missed.
