“ My father served under Captain Slaughter. He was a sailor onboard the USS John D Ford and was badly injured when the ship collided with a British Trawler outside Gibraltar, March 29, 1944. My father was only 17 when he enlisted. My father passed in 1971 but before he did he conveyed to me, his son, how compassionate Captain Jack was. See my father was badly injured and protocol dictated that my father stay behind in Gibraltar when the Ford sailed...not wanting that my father begged Captain Jack not to leave him behind even though it was probably the medically correct thing to do. Captain Jack did the humane thing. He broke regulations, let my wounded dad stay in his own cabin and took my dad home to the Chelsea Naval Hospital outside Boston. I never realized Captain Jack was a mere 26 when he was in Command of the USS John D. Ford. This but small story is all I know of Captain John "Jack" Slaughter. Just one act in an illustrious career but one that will never be forgotten by the Coughlin family...I later joined the military and a cornerstone of my service was treating the Soldiers under my command as good as Captain Jack treated my father. Rest in peace Captain Jack...enjoy that well deserved shore leave in that better place where you no doubt be reunited with the many people whose lives who made better
