



Mrs Judy Kay Langmead

September 11, 1943 - January 27, 2024

Judy Kay Langmead, 80, died peacefully at home on January 27, 2024, after a long illness. She was born in Virginia on September 11, 1943, the only child of Col. Charles R. and Ruth L. Kearney, both originally from western Pennsylvania. The family settled in Baltimore in 1957 after living in several locations in both Europe and the United States. She married Joseph M. Langmead in 1969 during his period of military service and returned with him to Baltimore in 1970. Their three children, Maureen Evelyn, Gregory Charles, and Benjamin Thomas, were born in 1970, 1973, and 1981.

She is a graduate of Towson High School and Notre Dame of Maryland University. She later completed graduate courses at St. Mary's Ecumenical Institute.

Prior to her marriage, she was employed as an accountant by several organizations. As her children became older, she served in volunteer roles for a variety of non-profit organizations, including St. Mary's Ecumenical Institute, St. Vincent's Villa, Cathedral of Mary Our Queen, and others. She also served as lector in her parish churches in both Baltimore and London, England.
