At our 9th grade graduation ceremony at Woodbourne Leigh gave me the honor of being the trumpet soloist on the featured band piece called "Conversation for Cornet". It was the first time I ever performed an entire solo piece in front of a band. I remember it and can still play it from memory today :)

Leigh also had my 9th grade friend first chair clarinetist Tom Henning (who later became a lawyer in Baltimore) be the student conductor for the piece.

I have never forgotten the music and life lessons and inspiration he shared then.
