



Mr. Richard C. Manning III

October 7, 1928 - April 10, 2017

Richard Charles Manning, III (Dick) died April 10, at Roland Park Place from diabetes. Dick was born October 7, 1928. He was 88 years old. He is survived by his wife Mary Frances Manning (nee Russell).

Born in Baltimore the son of Richard Charles Manning, Jr. and Frances Stotesbury Manning, (nee Focke). He lived in the 1600 block of Bolton Street until moving to Roland Park as a very young boy where he lived until his death. After graduating from Baltimore City College, he joined the Navy and served with the North Atlantic Fleet. Upon discharge from the military, he joined the family business, Equable Fuel Co. When the business was sold, he worked for The Baltimore News American in retail sales. In 1966, he left the news and went to work for a newspaper in Sydney, Australia. After a brief time, he left the paper, bought a used car, and traveled and tried to see as much of the continent in less than two years, working at many and various jobs, including time on a sheep station. He said sheep were very wooley and cute, but very odoriferous. He said the most unusual sight when on the station was when he encountered a group of Jack Rabbits. They were huge, with great long ears and gigantic front teeth, not a bit like any bunny he had ever seen. Returning to the United States, he worked for Baltimore Gas & Electric Co., retiring in 1994. When employed with BGE, he divided his time between Baltimore and the nuclear facility, Calvert Cliffs. Having spent his summers in Ocean City, New Jersey, he had a great love for the ocean and was an excellent swimmer. He enjoyed ballroom dancing and was an avid reader and

history buff, especially world history and politics.

He was a member of the Society of Colonial Wars, The Society of Sons of the Revolution, The Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, The Society of the War of 1812. He also was a member of the St. Andrew's Society, The St. George Society, The Paint and Powder Club and several other patriotic and fraternal organizations.

He was a member of the Johns Hopkins Club and was a member of Baltimore Country Club. Interment private. A memorial service will be held Thursday, May 18, 11AM, at Grace United Methodist Church, where he was a member.
